Request: Revised numbering/designation for CDS 4850 Independent Study

Rationale for the Request: Current catalog wording only allows 1 repetition of CDS 4850 Independent Study for undergraduate students. The CDS department is increasingly seeing students interested in utilizing independent study courses to fulfill university hour requirements and pursue individual interests. Without having different numbers or letters, financial aid guidelines limit repetition of the same course number more than twice. By offering multiple sections, students will be provided flexibility in pursuing independent study in CDS that meets their educational needs.

Proposed Curricular Revisions to the Aging Studies Graduate Program

Rationale:

Faculty in the Human Services Department have conducted a thorough review of the Aging Studies Graduate Program for the M.S. in Aging Studies Option, M.S. in Aging Studies Long Term Care Administration Option, and respective Aging Studies Accelerated Graduate Programs. There are no individual course revisions or newly developed courses being proposed. Furthermore, no changes are being proposed to any of the required courses for the graduate and accelerated graduate programs.

Additions of course electives were made for two reasons: (1) all newly added elective courses align with the program's focus on aging, families, and later life development and stages and (2) an increased number of electives allows students a greater selection choice and accessibility to courses. Deletions of course electives were made because the respective courses are no longer offered.

Finally, technical revisions were made to terminology, phrasing, and placement for greater clarity in explanations and descriptions.

Program Mission: The mission of the Master of Science in Aging Studies is to prepare future and current leaders in the aging/gerontology fields through an interdisciplinary education to be productive professionals who serve the aging needs of diverse local, regional, national, and international populations. Students will acquire specialized expertise, competencies, and skills in older adulthood, processes of aging, and later life stages through the study of theory, research, practice, and policy. Students will be prepared to begin or advance careers focused on but not limited to: administration and leadership in national, state, and local government or nonprofit aging-specific programs; human and social services resource and case management for aging individuals and families; and aging research and policy.

Program Mission: The online Master of Science in Aging Studies program is designed to provide an interdisciplinary education for future and current professionals in aging/gerontology. Students will acquire specialized expertise in older adulthood, processes of aging, and later life stages through the study of gerontological theory, research, professional practice, policy, and the process of aging and cultural diversity. Students will be prepared for a wide range of careers in the field of aging/gerontology, including positions in human social services, program administration, residential long term care, geriatric health care programs, government services, and professional organizations, community outreach and education, and entrepreneurship. Two options include: (1) the M.S. in Aging Studies or the (2) the M.S. in Aging Studies: Long Term Care Administration.

Note: The M.S. in Aging Studies prepares students for beginning or continuing careers focused on but not limited to: administration and leadership in national, state, and local government or nonprofit aging-specific programs; human and social services resources for aging; aging research and/or policy; and case management services for older adults.

Admission Requirements: Two Aging Studies degree options include (1) the M.S. in Aging Studies or (2) the M.S. in Aging Studies: Long Term Care Administration. To be eligible for degree candidacy, applicants must meet all of the requirements for admission to the Graduate School (see "Admission to Graduate Degree and Certificate Programs"). Additional requirements include an essay describing academic/career interests and goals and an assessment of strengths and areas of growth, and two academic or professional reference letters.

Online Format: The graduate degree program is completed in the form of online courses to fulfill the required minimum total of 33 credit hours. All required courses are offered online regularly. A limited number of courses are also available in face-to-face or hybrid formats.

Degree Audit: The graduate plan of study is the EIU Degree Audit, which is generated automatically at the time of degree or certificate candidacy. Modifications of the standard EIU Degree Audit are submitted by the graduate coordinator to the certification officer in the Graduate School at the time modifications are approved. The Degree Audit serves as an unofficial summary of requirements for the program. Degree and certificate candidates are advised to review the comprehensive summary of the Degree Audit process specified on the "<u>Requirements for All</u> <u>Degree and Certificate Candidates</u>" section of the Graduate Catalog. Individual programs may require candidates to submit plans of study in addition to the Degree Audit; candidates should consult with the program coordinator.

Proposed Curriculum Revisions to the Human Services Graduate Program

Rationale:

Faculty in the Human Services Department have thoroughly reviewed the Human Services Graduate Program for the M.S. in Human Services and Human Services Accelerated Graduate Program. There are no individual course revisions or newly developed courses being proposed. Furthermore, no changes are being proposed to any of the required courses for the graduate program.

Additions of course electives were made for two reasons: (1) all newly added elective courses align with the program's focus on human services and programming for individuals, families, and communities and (2) an increased number of electives allows students a greater selection choice and accessibility to courses. Deletions of course electives were made because the respective courses are no longer offered.

Undergraduate course deficiency requirements were deleted as those pertained to the former/now non-existent M.S. in Family and Consumer Sciences degree and are no longer necessary for the successful completion of the current program's graduate courses.

Finally, technical revisions were made to terminology, phrasing, and placement for greater clarity in explanations and descriptions.

Rationale:

The accelerated graduate program in Higher Education and Community College (HECC) will allow qualified undergraduate interdisciplinary studies students desiring employment in higher education settings to shorten the length of the MS in Higher Education and Community College (currently 3 years, F/SP/SU). The accelerated program is a cost savings to EIU undergraduates, has the potential to enhance enrollment in the degree program, and provides challenging graduate-level coursework to potential graduate students. Students may apply a maximum of 15 HECC credits to their undergraduate degree.

Admission Requirements:

Admission to the accelerated graduate program in Higher Education and Community College requires that applicants

- have a minimum EIU undergraduate cumulative GPA of 3.25
- have a minimum of 90 credit hours of undergraduate course completed
- completion of at least 15 credit hours of courses in the interdisciplinary studies program
- submit a resume, two letters of recommendation, and a statement of professional goals

All admitted students must meet with the Higher Education and Community College graduate coordinator in addition to the interdisciplinary studies academic advisor to select courses.

Accelerated Master of Science in College Student Affairs with a concentration in Higher Education and Community College

The Department of Counseling and Higher Education is pleased to offer an accelerated path to the completion of the Master of Science in College Student Affairs with a concentration in Higher Education and Community Colleges (HECC) to students enrolled in the undergraduate Interdisciplinary Studies (IDS) Program. The accelerated master's programs (also known as BS/MS or BA/MS) are designed for motivated students who would like to earn credits towards a master's degree while obtaining a bachelor's degree, thereby shortening the time to the attainment of a master's degree and reducing overall educational costs.

The online Master of Science in College Student Affairs degree with a concentration in Higher Education and Community College requires 43 credits of graduate work. Up to **15 hours** of graduate credit earned as an undergraduate can be applied for credit toward a master's degree. Required courses for the M.S. in degree are listed in the graduate catalog. Students may take equivalent courses in the in-person College Student Affairs with department approval.

IDS Students who are interested in this opportunity should meet with the HECC program coordinator. Students must apply to the Graduate School when they are within 15-30 hours of completing the IDS program for official admission to the HECC program.
