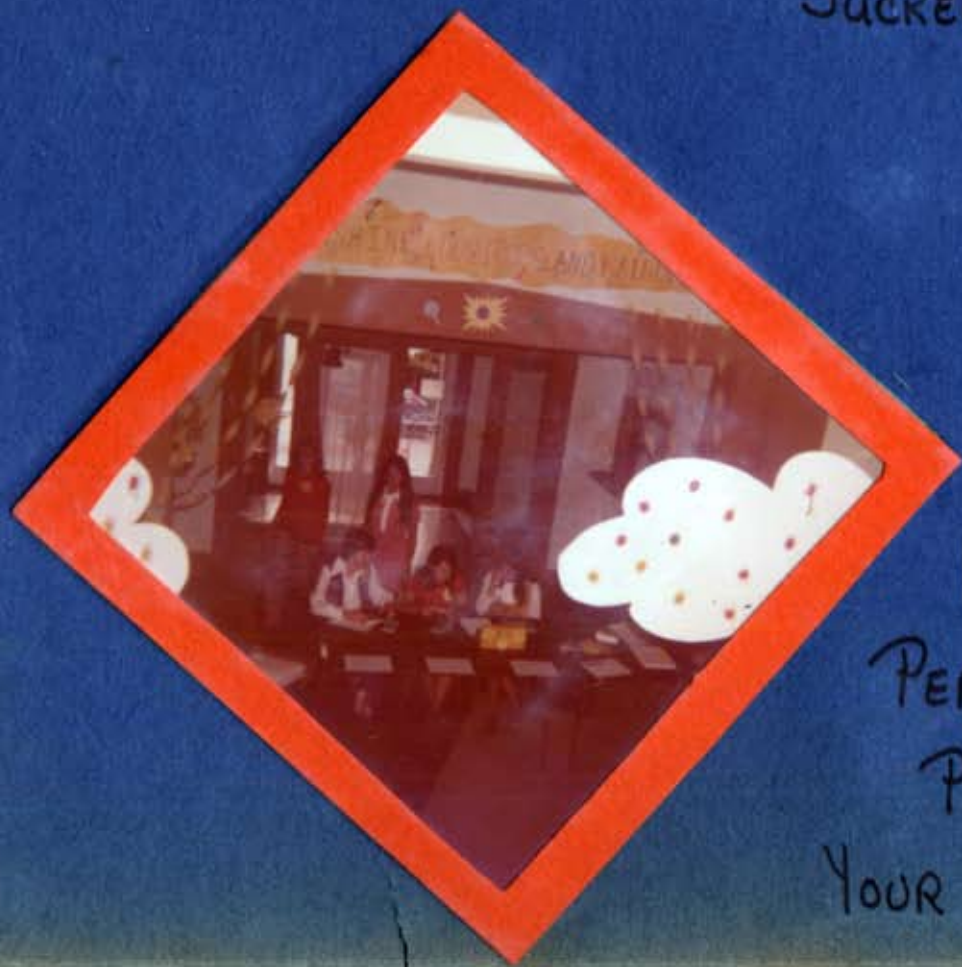

# Past and present of Pem Hall discussed

Because of the housing situation at Eastern, there has been talk of having to close a dorm. Possibly, Pemberton Hall could be the one to be closed.

Concerned "Pemites" have vowed to fight any such move if it comes about. Some have stated they would rather move off campus than move to another dorm.

HOW hard the "Pemites" would fight such a decision is yet to be seen.

However, it's unlikely that the "Pemites" will have to undertake a struggle of the magnitude that Livingston C. Lord had to undertake to get Pemberton Hall built in the first place. It took him eight years.

Pemberton Hall was the brain child of the former president. He favored building the women's dormitory over building a gym because he felt the dorm would promote a respectable social life.

SO, in 1901, Mr. Lord went before the State Legislature in Springfield with a request for the \$60,000 project. At this time there were no such things

as dormitories in Illinois. Lord's request was turned down. "There wasn't a bit of sympathy with the request," the president observed.

Mr. Lord decided to try again in 1903. This time he added a gym to his request. But again he was rebuffed.

In 1907, Lord went back to Springfield. This time he had the support of Stanton Pemberton, a Senator from Oakland. He not only got the dorm approved, but also the "crackerbox gym".

FOR his efforts, Stanton Pemberton had the new building named after him in 1909.

Dining service was started in 1908. Table board was \$2.25 a week. Any Eastern student could eat there. Since it opened, the kitchen has been a place for student employment. At this time it was the only dining area on campus.

Hours were strict for early "Pemites". They had to be in by 7:30 p.m. on school nights. On Friday and Saturday night, the curfew was extended to 10:00 p.m. In addition, men could be entertained in the

parlor on these two evenings. Residents could attend church without a chaperone, but for picnics, dances, and theater trips they had to have an escort.

THESE rules did not prevent the residents from breaking them. Quite often girls would slip out the windows on sheet ropes to meet men waiting in the bushes below. Late hour conversations with men standing outside the windows were frequent and provided entertainment for the whole floor.

Many of these accounts were told in the "Page Pandora." This

was a column in the weekly student newspaper that was devoted to activities at Pemberton Hall. Starting in 1917, "Pemites" had their own

hall government.

TODAY Pem is old with ivy and trees. It has outlived the "crackerbox" gym and the greenhouse.

Among other changes, a new wing has now been added to Pemberton and it is now characterized by an old and new part.

KEEPING in line with the theme, many of the girls were dressed in long dresses, reminiscent of the old days.

Having spend 26 years in Oklahoma, President Fite says he considers it his home. And to make him feel especially welcome in their home the Pemiters sang "Oklahoma" and "Okie from Muskogee."

Made possible by the increase of foreign students in

# Christmas still celebrated in Vietnam

Although there is a war going on, Christmas is still celebrated in Viet Nam. Kim-Khue Tran, a student from South Vietnam, described how the Vietnamese people celebrate the holiday.

Kim-Khue said that Christmas in Viet Nam is like Christmas in the United States in some respects. There is an exchanging of gifts, sending of Christmas cards, and eating a traditional European meal such as turkey and dressing.

The poor Christian people in Viet Nam however, eat chicken and rice. Kim-Khue said that the poor Christians are refugees from the north. Most Christians in Vietnam are middle class. The people put a pine tree in the house and decorate it much like as in America. But Kim-Khue says that the tree in Vietnam is not totally like the traditional Christmas tree in America.

### War Limits Holiday

Kim-Khue pointed out that the biggest holiday in Vietnam is the Asian Lunar New Year or Tet. Unlike the western New Year, Tet is celebrated in February. Tet is a happy time of the year says Kim-Khue. Because of the war firecrackers have been

Although most people are Buddhist, Kim-Khue says that in

Vietnam it is possible to believe in more than one religion. Kim-Khue is a freshman business major from Saigon. Upon returning to Vietnam she says she would like to work in a bank.

### Greek Pomegranate

Also describing Christmas in her home country was Kleopatra Paretzoglou, graduate English

student from Greece. She said that many of the American traditions of Christmas are followed in Greece.

In Greece presents are not opened until New Years Eve. The Greek Santa Claus is called St. Basil and he comes on New

Years Eve.

On New Years day, the Greek family goes to early Mass. Upon returning the father throws a fruit called a pomegranate onto the steps of the house. As it shatters, the house is blessed with good luck.

# Leadership workshop includes coed living, sensitivity session



Judges for the bowl were Jane Reed of Douglas Hall and Kris Jensen from Ford.

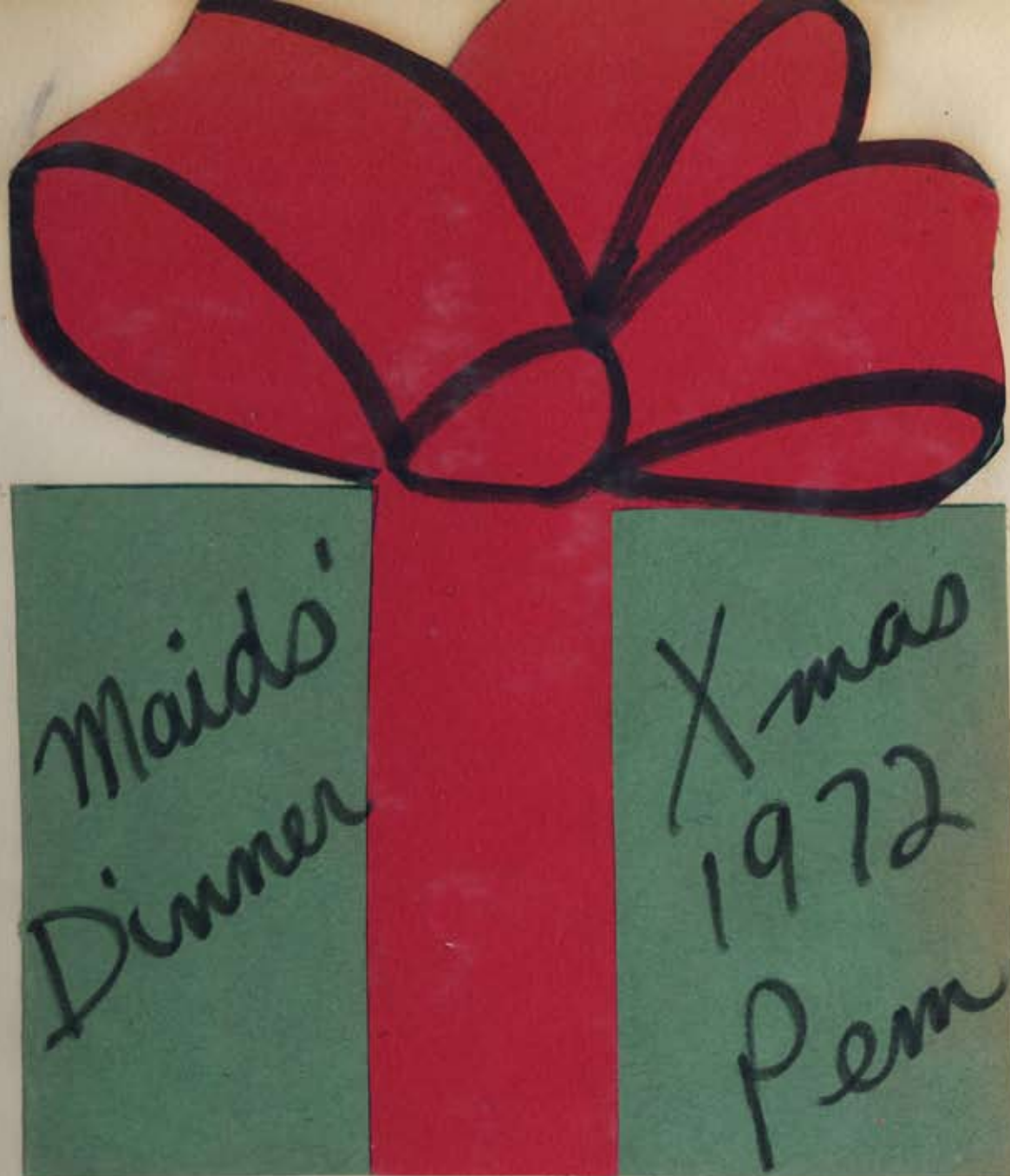
