#### RHA's annual Haunted House set in Pem Hall

This year's Residence Hall Association Haunted House will be held on the mysterious fourth floor of Pemberton Hall, Committee Co-chairmen Alen Miller and Bob Gagner said.

Not only do they guarantee the presence of the ghost of fourth floor, "but a few other things might be hanging around," they said.

Tradition says the floor has been haunted since a student was murdered there 61 years ago.

Officials in the housing office said they could not remember the last time someone lived there.

The event will be held Saturday, and admission is 50 cents.

Mysterious sounds echo in the middle of the night. Doors swing back and forth, open and shut, and dresser drawers pop out without help.

A matronly ghost is checking to make sure her girls are safe in their rooms.

One of the first stories freshmen may hear at Eastern is the legend of the ghost of the coed who was murdered more than 60 years ago in Pemberton Hall, the oldest dorm in the state.

Some say they can even hear the girl scratching on the hall doors on particular nights, the fingernails of the ghost of the dead former Pem resident who was supposedly murdered on the fourth floor by an insane janitor.

The matronly ghost is that of Mary Hawkins, counselor of the dorm from 1910 to 1917. And her murderer's identity is still a mystery.

These and other ghost stories continue to spread through the dorm because of a plaque in the hall lobby dedicated to Hawkins.

In addition to the plaque, the fourth floor has been kept closed and locked to residents for a number of years, due to unfinished construction and keeping the floor as a storage area.

The closed floor has only added more and more to the stories. Rumors of fully-furnished rooms, bloody, scratched doors and closets of long, antique dresses cannot be denied by residents because they have never visited the fourth floor, which has been closed for many years.

"There's no truth to any of these stories," current Pem Hall Counselor Doris Enochs said. Hawkins did not die in the dorm, and there are no records of any murder, she added.

But in spite of this, and due to lack of proof to the contrary, ghost stories keep circulating and have elevated into much more detailed tales. This may be due to the tradition, Pemberton residents said, called "Upperclassmen Classics." Pem residents who were terrified of stories when they were freshmen keep it "alive and living" by passing down the story or even adding their own little details to new residents.

Residents have even gone to the point of using the stories for speeches in their classes.

"I think people like to believe in them because of the heritage and age that ghosts imply," Enochs said.

The age of the building also only helps to perpetuate the stories, Enochs continued.

"Whenever the wind blows, naturally you have weird sounds because of the age and construction of the building. Old buildings always creak," she added.

However, no simple explanations can silence the stories which are accepted by many students every year.

The details may vary from story to story, but Mary Hawkins is usually the highlight or central figure.

It is the murder story in the true horror tradition. The lines vary, but the overall plot appears clear:

She is one of the few girls staying in Pem over Christmas break, and it is a dark, cold and lonely night on the campus.

While she is playing the piano in the fourth floor music room, (the highest floor in Pem), she is axed to death by a sex-crazed janitor.

According to the story, "Mary" manages to pull herself to her room where, unable to speak, she scratches at the door.

Her roommate, too terrified to reply to the scratching at the time, discovers her dead companion lying in a pool of blood in the hallway when opening the door later in the early morning hours.

To this very day, the legend says the murdered soul still crawls the halls at night, scratching on the doors with her fingernails.

These stories are not all that remains of the ghost tale. The residents of Pemberton themselves have reported unusual occurances at the dorm.

She is the kindly but dead dorm mother watching over "her girls," but some story tellers have also said the mystical "Mary" was a resident of Pemberton Hall, murdered more than 60 years ago. One of the first stories freshmen may hear at Eastern is the legend of the ghost of Pemberton, the oldest dormitory in the state.

A resident assistant of Pem who preferred to remain anonymous, said recently that on several occasions, residents' windows that were closed well before bedtime were found wide open in the morning.

She also said that some residents experienced articles of clothing and other items missing from their rooms.

The missing clothes and items always mysteriously returned, however, exactly two weeks after they disappeared.

She also noted they ended up in a very obvious location where they never could have been misplaced by the owner.

Another incident four years ago involved a girl wearing a long, white nightgown going from door to door

asking for safety pins. No one knew the identity of the girl, and several girls followed her to the fourth floor landing where she disappeared.

Is this a case of over-active imagination?

Residents at Pem claim that there is something thrilling in having a ghost because it sets Pem apart from the other dorms.

And "some people just do it for excitement."

And the stories that have haunted Pemberton Hall and the secrets of the fourth floor will finally be available for public scrutiny.

On Saturday, the one and only fourth floor will be opened for the first time in many, many years.

Enochs said that she does not know when the last time the fourth floor was open. "It was before my time."

Assistant Housing Director Randy Johnson, a member of the housing staff for many years, also said he can not recall when the hall's fourth floor was ever open for use by the student body.

The Residence Hall Association (RHA) has scheduled its annual haunted house from 6:30 p.m. to 11 p.m. on that floor that night.

The RHA has planned a spook-filled event scary enough for any nonbeliever.



### 'Under Milk Wood' to portray village life

A part of the untouched world of a Welsh fishing village and the lives of 70 of its inhabitants will be presented this weekend in the theatre department's production of Dylan Thomas' "Under Milk Wood."

Directed by Donna Shehorn of the theatre department, the interpretive play will premiere at 8 p.m. Friday and continue at 8 p.m. Saturday and Monday and 2 p.m. Sunday in the Playroom of the Fine Arts Center.

The citizens of the hypothetical town of "Llareggub" off the coast of Wales, will be portrayed by a strong cast of six women and nine men, Shehorn said.

"Under Milk Wood" does not follow the traditional plot line, she explained, but "highlights the inhabitants of the village, orchestrated by two voices who act as narrators."

The two omniscient voices are played by seniors Gary Schrader as the First Voice and Scott Zimmerman as the Second Voice.

Shehorn said each actor portrays a number of different characters throughout the production.

For example, one woman will play the town's lady of easy virtue, a person from another man's past and a neighbor. Another actor will play both the police constable and the owner of a dry-goods store as part of his multiple roles.

"It's a challenge to find a number of ways to portray each character," Shehorn said, but added that she thinks the cast will make the town come to life for the audience.

The 15 actors have been rehearsing three hours per day since Labor Day developing the many characters they will present.

"Under Milk Wood" is set in modern times, and Shehorn described it as serious and humorous— with a bit of slapstick, and realistic, as it contains "all manners of emotion."

The characters are shown "living their own lives, untouched by society so that they retain their innocence," she said.

The play is the last piece Dylan Thomas wrote in 1953 before he died, Shehorn continued, and contains a poetic feeling, although it is not written in verse.

The set, designed by seniors William J. Pierson and John Tilford, is suggestive of the worn and weathered docks and piers around the fishing village, located at the bottom of "Milk Wood."

Costume designer is Sue Saltmarsh, who changes something on every character so that the audience can differentiate the various villagers, Shehorn said.

The play will also include a few little folksongs written by Thomas which will be sung by individual cast members, accompanied by senior Ed Kickham.

Cast members other than those mentioned are Pierson and Tilford, seniors Earl Halbe, Julie Woosley,

Laurie Bielong and Marge Rapp.

Also in the cast are Katie Ridenour, junior, Kathy Lampem, sophomore, Brent Krueger, sophomore, and freshmen Robert Scheemacher, Douglas Wroble, Donna Parrone and Eric Steidinger.

"I'm very pleased with the show,"

Shehorn added. "It's strong and entertaining, and I think the audience will enjoy it."

Tickets for the production are \$1 for Eastern students, \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for children. Reservations may be made by calling 581-3110.

### Women tracksters win own invitational

Eastern's women tracksters won eight of eighteen events Saturday as they easily swept the four-team EIU Invitational.

The Panthers, coming off their best performance ever the week before at the Illini Invitational, compiled a whopping 118 points. That total easily outdistanced runner-up Western Michigan University's 75 points. Southeast Missouri had 64, while Southwestern Michigan scored only 14 points while finishing fourth.

Head coach Joan Schmidt was understandably happy with the outcome.

Saturday's eyent was different from those in the past in that most distances were measured in meters.

"Anything we did was a new record because we generally don't run in meters," Schmidt said.


Junior Jo Huber emerged as the only double winner of the day for Eastern. Huber heaved the shot 13.0 meters (42.9 feet) to gain one win, and hurled the discus 39.16 meters (129.2 feet) for her other triumph.

Donna Gale gave the Panthers their other first place in the field events, throwing the javelin 105' 3".

Robin Smith ran away from the field in the 5,000 meter run to win in a time of 17:31.4. Smith's nearest competitor was Western Michigan's Sue Mac-Donald, who took second with a 18:38.4 clocking. Smith added a second place finish in the 3,000 meters to aid the Panther effort.

Taking first place in the 400-meter hurdles was junior Carmen Ritz, who turned in a time of 1:02.9. Ritz also clocked a 2:22.5 in the 800-meter run which was good enough for a second place finish.

The only other individual winner for the Panthers was freshman Melissa



More impressive performances were turned in by the Panthers in the relays. The two-mile and the 440-yard relay teams both came out on top.

The two-mile unit was comprised of Ritz, Sonia Olson, Deb Schabow, and Linda Lomax. The four turned in a winning time of 10:05.1.

The 440-yard team was Audrey Marrocco, Marche Harris, Mary Jane Crouch, and Mary Martello.



### Women's indoor track season to open Saturday

Eastern's women's track team will open its home indoor season with a triangular against Southeast Missouri State and Ball State Saturday in Lantz Fieldhouse.

Field events begin at 11 a.m. and track events start at noon.

Coach Joan Schmidt said the meet looks to be a "highly competitive and well-balanced" meet.

"Where one team may be lacking in talent, the other team fills in with good, solid runners. It looks like it will be a close meet," she said.

One of the gaps that Schmidt feels that her Panthers will be able to fill, are the sprint and distance events.

"Both SEMO and Ball State are weaker in the sprinting and distances," she said. "I think that we can pick up the slack with our runners in those events."

Schmidt added that sprinters Mary Burroughs, Mary Martello and Audrey Morrocco are "capable of coming through for us" in the sprinting She also added that freshmen Kristian Webb and Tina Bartram had "good potential" to perform well in sprint events.

"Our sprinters looked real good at Wednesday's practice," she said, "we had a hard workout and they ran very well."

Schmidt will also look to Robin Smith in the distance events Saturday. Smith placed first in the 1,500 meter run and second in the 3,000 meter run at Saturday's Illinois State Invitational.

Schmidt said that she is also optimistic about the hurdling events.

"Susan Grider and Bettie Jo Hennig are capable of coming through for us in the hurdling events," she added.

Kimi Koury, a shot putter for Eastern is "very much improved," Schmidt said. "She has a real good chance to do well in this meet." The Panthers' other shot putter, Pat Carney is sidelined with an injured hand.

One strong disadvantage facing Eastern is that the Panthers have no high jumpers.

One of our high jumpers, Carol O'Connor is out with an injury and will not be able to jump until our outdoor season. Marche Harris, one of our other jumpers, is out because she is playing basketball," Schmidt said.

"We will be at a slight disadvantage, but we can make up the difference with our running events,"

Women tracksters take second at home indoor

Robin Smith won two distance events and paced the women's track team to a second place finish in the Eastern Invitational Saturday.

Winning the meet was Indiana State with 99 points to Eastern's 62. Chicago State, with 34 points, placed third and Northern Illinois was fourth with 13 points.

Smith won both the mile and two mile events to pace the Panthers. Smith took the mile with a time of 5:05.2, edging Indiana State's Kim Ankenbauer by two tenths of a second for the win.

In the two mile, Smith again nosed out Ankenbauer. Smith turned in a time of 11:02.3 to Ankenbauer's 11:14.9.

"Robin ran a smart race in the mile," Eastern head coach Joan Schmidt said. "Towards the end of the race, she held Ankenbauer to the outside and the strategy worked."

Carmen Ritz had two second place finishes to aid the Panthers. Ritz opened the meet with a second place finish in the 600 yard run. Ritz ran the distance in 1:27.0, and finished just behind Indiana State's Marian Kidd. Placing behind Ritz were Panthers Tina Bartram in third and Chris Holway in fifth.

and Deb Schabow in sixth.






