Pem Hall added to National Register

Pemberton Hall, the first dormitory at a state college or university in Illinois, has been placed on the list of National Register of Historic Places.

Dr. Robert Hennings, chairman of the Department of History, was notified of the selection. Two graduate students in the Historical Administration, Jan Luth and Renee Dancu, were responsible for the nomination.

Old Main was previously listed.

The women's residence hall, opened in 1909, is described as "an example of Collegiate Gothic Revival architecture. The style is characterized by the castellation above the main front and back entrances, heavy masonry construction, the use of gables and dormer windows.

"The architectural flavor is also seen in the ornamental work on the front entrance arch which lures the visitor to the doorway.

Local limestone blocks form the exterior walls and the roof is of red tile."

With the backing of Senator Stanton C. Pemberton of Oakland, President Livingston C. Lord began his battle for a girls' dormitory when the school was just over one year old. Lord believed such a building was "absolutely necessary" and he pointed out the social advantages of "a well-conducted dining room, and the occasional reception" would do much to help a person of intelligence and skill, but lacking in the social graces.

Lord was concurrently pushing for a gymnasium, to be located in the dormitory. A member of the House Committee in

Springfield advised Lord to drop the dormitory proposal "lest the chances of a gymnasium be endangered."

In a letter to Pemberton, Lord wrote this way: "If we cannot have but much prefer the dormitory. On the other hand, we do not wish to lose both, and far rather have the gymnasium than nothing."

After two governors had vetoed bills which would have provided facilities, Pemberton and Lord renewed their efforts and in 1907 the dormitory gymnasium item of \$100,000 was included in the school's appropriation bill.

approved.

Lord suggested the hall be named for Pemberton and the Springfield Journal with tongue in cheek noted that the senator "has been honored by having his name attached to a public school building. And it isn't any ordinary sort of building, either. It's a hall — one of those halls you read of in those delightful old English novels. Though, of course, it isn't an old hall now. It hopes to be some day and to have ivy clinging to its moss-covered walls and great wide-spreading trees. . . in the shade of which innumerable generations of students will loiter in reflective contemplation of the greatness of Senator Pemberton."

Cost to students in the new dormitory was \$4 per week and this included all meals and laundry privileges. Mary Hawkins, the first head of the hall, had some rather stringent rules when measured against today's residence hall living:

Students were allowed freedom during the day until 7:30 p.m. Then they were required to be in their rooms for study from 7:30 to 10

p.m. "From 10 to 10:30 p.m. they are free to do much as they please." And "at 10:30 their lights must be out and there must be absolute quiet in the hall."

Hawkins, "in most cases," allowed the girls to attend church without chaperones, but "I require them to have one (chaperone) when going out to a dance, the theater or on school picnics."

Dr. John Jacobs, on leave from the Department of Special Education, was an invited speaker for the Phi Delta Kappa chapter in Vincenza, Italy on Sept. 18. Jacobs currently is a visiting professor with Boston University in its overseas program.

Pemberton honored *Hall gains historic status*

Eastern received notice recently that Pemberton Hall, the first women's dormitory in Illinois, was added to the National Register of Historic Places.

Graduate students in Historical Administration Renee Dancu Henry and Jan Luth are responsible for the nomination.

In the spring of 1980 Henry prepared and sent a nomination for Pemberton to the Illinois Historic Sites Commission.

Approval was delayed because the IHSC did not believe that Pemberton Hall was the first women's dormitory at a public institution of higher learning in Illinois, History Department Chairman Robert Hennings wrote in a brief letter to an Eastern ad-

ministrators.

In the spring of 1982 Luth gathered historical data and prepared a second nomination and both were sent to the IHSC. The residence hall was then placed on the register after all necessary proof was received.

A segment of the nomination form reads: "From the time he assumed office as President of Eastern Illinois Normal School in 1899, Livingston C. Lord began his fight to obtain a women's dormitory. Students were living in off-campus boardinghouses and apartments. Many parents were concerned over the lack of supervision."

Pemberton Hall and gymnasium, named after Sen. Stanton C. Pemberton of Oakland, opened January 4, 1909, with a commemorative dinner.

Its Prevention Techniques

PSYCHOLOGICAL PREPAREDNESS

Accept the fact that **YOU** are a potential rapist frequently plans his crime. He is looking for a chance and the easiest victim. Your best defense — to eliminate his opportunity to attack — is in physical self-defense, assertiveness and your own ideas of how you would react in an assault. This seminar will help you cope effectively.

By observing the following common sense tips around your home, on the street and in your car, you can significantly reduce your chances of being raped.

IN YOUR HOME

1. There should be lights in all entrance areas and garages should be well lighted.
2. See that your home or apartment door has a peephole, dead bolt lock, and a chain.
3. All windows should have secure frames.
4. Trim bushes and shrubbery so no one can see into your home. Be aware of places where a man might hide, such as stairs, between buildings, in bushes, etc.
5. Keep your curtains pulled at night and windows drawn. (Pin drapes together if necessary.)
6. Don't get in an elevator alone with another person.
7. Keep doors locked. Keep garage and car doors locked as they provide easy access into your home.
8. Do not hide your keys under the doormat, in boxes or in mailboxes.
9. Do not leave notes on your door telling strangers about your planned return home.
10. Don't admit strangers into your home. Ask for your door until you know (and can see) who they are. If they need assistance, offer to make a call for them.

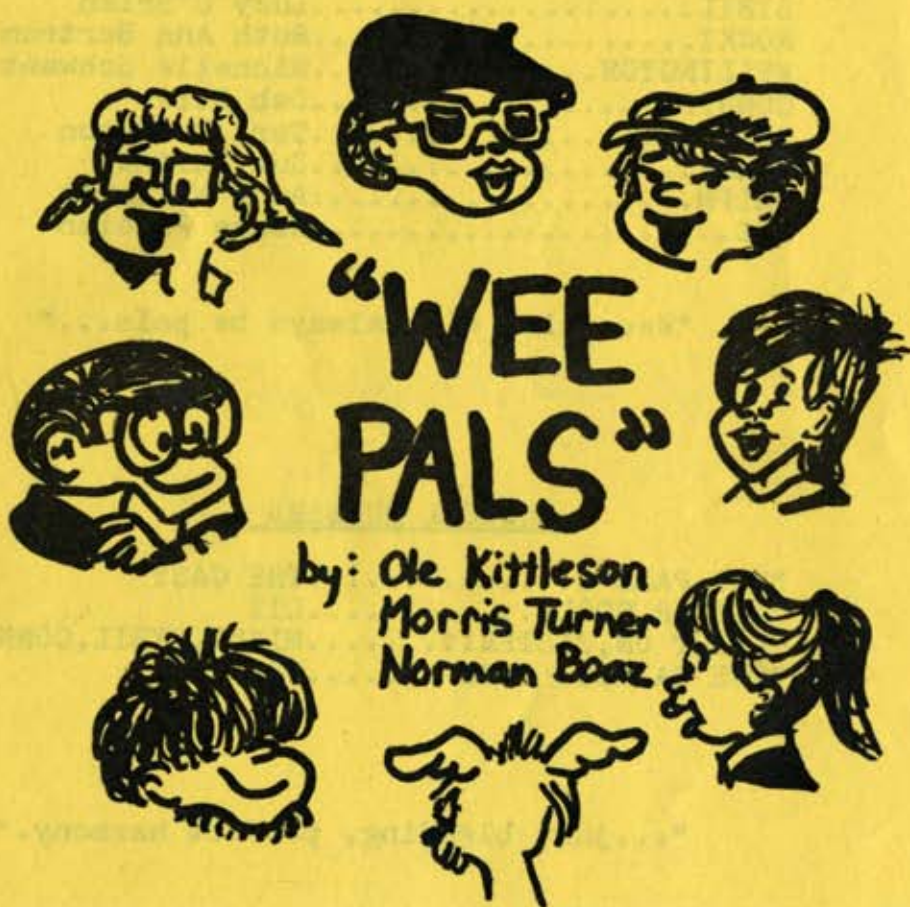

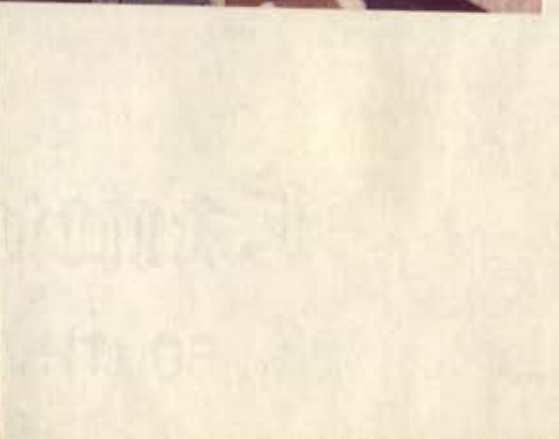

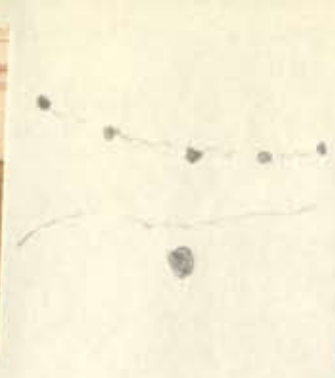
