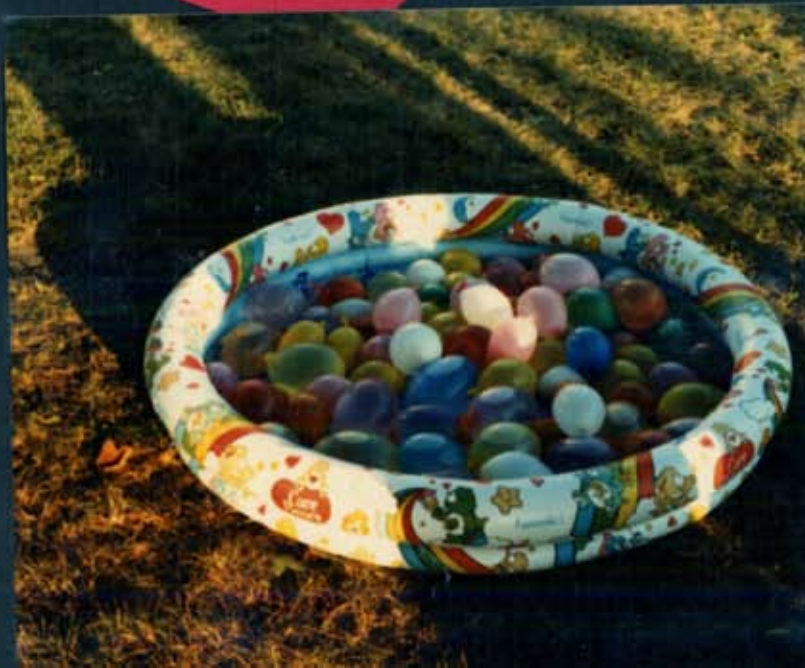

# Electrical fire evacuates hall

A fire in Pemberton Hall Wednesday night is believed to have been caused by an appliance plugged into an electrical outlet.

The fire, which was confined mainly to one room, caused an estimated \$500 damage, Housing Director Lou Hencken said Wednesday.

Hencken said the fire appeared to be "external" in origin and not an internal problem with the building's electrical wiring.

Campus Police Chief Tom Larson said the fire started either with an overload on the outlet or a "faulty end of hookup" in the room.

Housing officials said they would "take a look at it tomorrow" and see "if they can find anything out. There's going to be a lot of smoke damage."

Neither of the residents of the room, located on the second floor of the building's north side, were present at the time the fire started.

Pemberton's counselor, Patty Krenz, extinguished the blaze before firemen arrived on the scene shortly after the alarm was sounded around 8:40 p.m.

Hencken said a mattress, box springs and bed frame destroyed in the fire would have to be replaced. Fire and smoke near an outlet on the wall also damaged the wall, ceiling and one of the dressers in the room.

He added, "I could say some nice thing like 'Don't plug 12 things into an outlet,' but I don't think they did that."

He said Pemberton's wiring was replaced "about four or five years ago" and he doubted that was a factor in the blaze.

Pemberton, built in 1908, is the oldest women's residence hall in Illinois.

## Pemberton renovation set

With funding secured, renovations to convert Pemberton Hall's basement into storage for the Textbook Library will begin in October.

The Board of Governors approved \$62,911 for the renovations at Monday's meeting.

Richard Sandefer, Textbook Library director, said the renovations should be completed in a month or less.

The renovation plan includes taking a "fairly large area" in the basement of Pemberton, which is sectioned off into small rooms, and "turn it into one large warehouse area," he said.

During the renovations, all dividing walls that do not act as support for the ceiling.

The work will also include the installation of a sprinkler system and regulation fire doors.

Sandefer said the renovations need to be done in order to provide more space for the Textbook Library.

Even after distribution of books at the start of the semester, the Textbook Library has to store 120,000 to 150,000 books.

"We've had problems with space for a long time," Sandefer said, adding that he was confident the renovation would ease the crunch for space.

In addition, Sandefer said that any work done to Pemberton will not effect the service of the Textbook Library and Pemberton Hall residents will not be inconvenienced by the renovations.

## Pemberton presidential room renovated

Court awards and revenue from a summer retreat at Eastern last year paid for the recent renovation of the presidential dining room at Pemberton Residence Hall.

Eastern President Stanley Rives said the dining room will be used as a "place where we could have guests of the university, not only guests of the president."

Eastern Housing Director Lou Hencken said student fees were not used for the renovation, which was partially paid for through court awards stemming from a university case from the late 1970's.

Several companies had bid to sell chickens to Illinois institutions and had overcharged the schools for the poultry, he said.

Revenue from the case, handled by the Illinois attorney general, and funds

garnered from a 1983 summer retreat of a Christian group, paid for the renovation, Hencken added.

Renovations included the repair of a false ceiling and new lighting fixtures.

Pemberton hall counselor Patty Krenz said the construction caused "no problem at all" for residents, who had complained earlier in the year.

The dining room was often used as a study area by Pemberton residents, but Krenz said that the hall's upstairs television room will now be designated as a study area, and the students really are "not losing" anything through the renovation.

University craftsmen, including carpenters and painters, were used for the project. Carpetlayers working under an earlier contract for laying carpet in the Pemberton lounge also were used, he said.

Hencken said a major reason for the

renovation was the loss of revenue by Pemberton Food Service because of the small number of students served.

Hencken said he hopes the availability of the dining room for small university group meetings and dinners will give an "additional source of income for Pemberton Food Service."

The dining room will open by "next week," Hencken said, with a "few minor things" yet to be finished.

The dining room—which has been called the presidential dining room since the beginning of the university—was suffering from disuse, he said.

Hencken said he has received requests from Rives, faculty, student and administrative groups to use the room.

The first dinner in the presidential dining room is scheduled for Oct. 18 with Evelyn Kaufman, chairman of the Board of Governors.

## Pemberton ghost story: legend lives

Doors opening for no apparent reason, rattling windows, items inexplicably disappearing and heaters turning on and off are just some of the bizarre phenomenons which Pemberton residents blame on one of their supposed co-habitators.

No, this is not the resident thief or prankster, but a ghost—or at least that’s what some people believe.

The story all began when a resident of Pemberton was allegedly axed to death by a crazed janitor, Ada Dolz, senior and Pemberton Hall resident, said.

It was May of 1917 when a student who lived in Pemberton wandered up to the music room to play the piano late one night during Spring Break. Soon afterwards a janitor whose wife had died also journeyed into the attic. He then is said to have axed the girl, Dolz noted.

The girl, whose name is unknown, then crawled down the stairs to her counselor’s room and scratched on the door, Dolz said. The counselor’s name was Mary Hawkins.

Hawkins is said to have not opened her door, although she did supposedly hear the girl’s plea for help, Diana Winson, a sophomore and Pemberton resident said. The next morning Hawkins found the girl dead in front of her room.

Hawkins later went crazy and committed suicide in a sanitarium. Thus, the ghost, either of the alleged victim or the counselor, which has returned to her former home to haunt the current residents has been christened “Mary.”

At least that’s one story which has been handed for the past few generations by residents of Pemberton.

Other stories point to Hawkins as the girl who was axed.

Most of this is simply based on hearsay, and, of course all rumors were started by someone. A Pemberton file story noted that the rumors may have been started by a 30 year-old resident named Utera Sharps in the 1920’s.

Sharps was a psychology major interested in hypnotism who told other residents that a girl had been killed in the attic. Upon occasion, Sharps was known to jump out of closets in attempts to frighten other residents.

Apparently, either Sharps and her followers have been very successful in frightening Pemberton girls, or perhaps the legend is true.

“I do believe there’s a ghost there.” Judy Klancic, a senior and former Pemberton resident said. She attributed her belief to incidents which she witnessed during her two year stay in the hall.

“The door would open at three o’clock in the morning, and I thought that maybe it was one of my roommates getting up to go the bathroom or something,” Klancic said. “But when we all awakened the next morning none of us had left the room during the night.”

“She (the ghost) probably was a counselor,” Klancic said, “and now she’s checking on her girls. She’s harmless.”

Klancic also said the heat would get turned on and off and windows would open; however, she noted that these situations could be blamed on a variety of factors.

Similar occurrences have befallen other current residents of Pemberton.

Sophomore Cindy Baum said that one night she was positive she had lock-

ed her door, she even heard the lock click, but the door was somehow unlocked allowing friends to enter her room and rearrange her furniture. Baum added that she never had any problems with the lock before or after the incident.

Baum found herself in other spooky situations.

“Last year, one of my friends and I were sitting in my room,” she said. “We have a metal closet and it started to shake. There’s nothing by the door and we live in the end, so it couldn’t have been the neighbors.”

Another factor which may have added to the girls’ fear is visiting the attic, which is currently blocked off most of the time. However, some residents have journeyed up to the top floor; especially recently due to a fund raiser conducted by the hall council which offers tours of the attic this week.

“I went up to the fourth floor.”

sophomore Diana Winson said. “It looked pretty eerie. A lot of it is unfinished and there are four or five dorm rooms that are blocked off.”

Pemberton Hall Counselor Patty Krenz also noted that the piano is still in the former music lounge and part of the ivory from the keys has been chipped away.

She added that there are red blotches on the floor; however, she also noted that the attic was formerly used as a haunted house by the Residence Hall Association.

Krenz also said nothing really frightening has happened to her, although the building does tend to make strange noises due to its age.

What is fact and what is fiction is not clear in the Pemberton Hall ghost story, but who knows what evil lurks behind some of the unusual incidents which have taken place there.

# I ain't afraid of no ghosts!

CHARLESTON — As a ghostbuster, I'm a bust. The ghost of "Mary" — if it exists — still roams Pemberton Hall at Eastern Illinois University.

But, I'm getting ahead of my story.

With Halloween just around the corner, I decided it would be a good time to try to meet the fabled Mary, who has thrilled and chilled students since the 1920s.

What better way than to spend a night in her fourth floor quarters at Pem Hall (nobody calls it Pemberton). Opened in 1908, it is the oldest women's dormitory in the state. The fourth floor is where Mary is supposed to hang out when she's not haunting.

When I arrived a few days ago, resident assistant Patty Krenz of Glen Ellyn took me to the locked fourth floor for a quick tour. I wasn't too impressed. It looked like any other old unfinished attic in which several rooms had been built and abandoned. But that was late in the afternoon, and there was plenty of light streaming through the grimy windows.

THEN ABOUT 15 coeds met with me in the hall's lounge and pumped me full of eerie incidents they had experienced or seen: shadows in unoccupied rooms, doors locked and unlocked, stereos and TV sets turned on and off, fingernails scratching on doors.

By the time they had finished, the wind was howling and rain was falling. It was the kind of night ghosts love.

I passed a student ironing on the third floor. "You're not really going to sleep up there?" she said, noting the sleeping bag I carried. She shivered.

Arriving at my destination, I too shivered. The wind whooshed around the gables, rain rattled against the roof, dancing tree limbs cast flickering shadows. The air felt heavy, musty.

At the top of the steps, I flicked light switches, but bulbs were burned out. Fumbling in my camera bag, I pulled out a penlight that threw a small, weak beam.

I FOUND THE music room where I would spend the

night. A light in the closet was burning. Who had left it on? How long ago? Mary? Are you here? My courage began to falter, but then I remembered that Mary is a good ghost — prankish but the non-hurting type. (I also had learned earlier that there are at least three other ghosts in the dormitory, but none is as well-known or active as Mary.)

In my room, a dirt-littered green rug covered most

of the hardwood floor. Furnishings included two sagging leather couches without cushions, an overstuffed chair, an old floor-model radio and a black upright piano.

An open door separated the finished attic area where I was from an unfinished section. There I found working light bulbs. With white-painted wall studs forming unfinished rooms and hallways, the space looked like the bleached skeleton of a prehistoric monster. And here the wind roared even louder and boards creaked and

groaned. I flicked off the lights and retreated to the music room.

I SPREAD MY sleeping bag on one of the couches and settled down to wait for a spectral visitor. I had begun to doze when I heard doors opening. Mary?

Alas, it was earthly voices ... some of the students dropping in for a visit. I welcomed them properly by hiding behind a door. As they approached, I jumped and yelled. They screamed and giggled and I invited them into the music room. They wanted to see the rest of the fourth floor so I became a tour guide.

When they left, I again stretched out on the couch. Soon whispering voices murmured, "Maybe he's sleeping." "You think it's OK?" I took up my position behind the door. They screamed better than the first bunch when I popped out. I conducted another tour.

By now the fourth floor was as familiar as my cluttered garage. At 12:44 a.m., the hall doors opened again. "Now don't scare us," a voice called, so I stepped out from my hiding place into the beam of their flashlight. This group of six and I talked until 1 a.m. and they plied me with more ghostly tales.

ALONE AT LAST, I slept fitfully. Unusual noises brought me instantly awake. At 3:16 a.m., the pungent smell of old wood jarred me. Incense? Was Mary burning incense? No. It was just the smell of the couch I hadn't noticed before. A door banged somewhere in the distance. The wind quieted and with it went many of the attic's sounds and shadows. I was alone on Pemberton Hall's infamous fourth floor.

I slept.

As I was leaving in the morning, one of the students asked, "Weren't you scared? Did you see Mary?"

"I was a little apprehensive at first," I said truthfully. "And, no, I didn't see Mary. But I sure saw a lot of non-ghosts."

I was disappointed Mary didn't appear, but deep down I didn't think I would have a ghost of a chance of meeting her anyway.

# Was 'Mary' dorm's late-night visitor?

CHARLESTON — I lived in Pemberton Hall at Eastern Illinois University for three years before I had my first and only encounter with "Mary" — the guardian ghost of Pem.

It was the spring semester of 1981, close to mid-term, when I saw what appeared to be Mary standing by my bed.

My roommate and I lived on the first floor of the 60-year-old "new" section of the dorm, which is the oldest in Illinois.

Pem has a personality that jumps out at you. There are cubbyholes where stairways have been bricked off and tunnels — now closed off — that lead to other buildings on campus.

The night Mary "visited" me, my roommate went to bed early while I stayed up to study to about 1:30 a.m.

Before turning off the lights, I went to the door and turned the lock, but because of damp weather the door would have had to be slammed for the lock to catch.

I THOUGHT ABOUT whether I should try to shut it harder or leave it. Pem is a small all-female dorm where everyone looks out for one another. We rarely locked our door, so I left it the way it was.

I went to sleep facing the wall with my back toward the door. I was in a very light sleep when I got an awful feeling that someone was watching me. As I turned over to look, I glanced at the glow-in-the-dark digital numbers on the clock. It was 2:15 a.m.

When I turned I saw a figure standing by the side of my bed dressed in something like a long nightgown or robe. The figure stood there for several seconds, then turned away and walked toward the door.

She opened the door and started to leave when she turned around with her hand on

the door and looked back at me for several more seconds. She left, closing the door behind her. I went back to sleep.

MY FIRST THOUGHT was that it was my roommate, possibly feeling ill. I remember saying something at that point, but I can't recall what. As the figure left, I recall telling her not to shut the door because she would be locked out.

The following morning I asked my roommate if she had gotten up during the night. She said she hadn't.

I asked other Pem residents if they had seen anyone enter our room to borrow something, but the answer was no.

After I relayed the story, girls in two other rooms both said they experienced something strange the same night.

The girls in the room directly across the hall from mine said they had gotten up three separate times during the night to shut their door,

although it was supposedly locked.

The heavy wooden doors in Pem do not blow open, they blow shut.

Other happenings were reported a few doors down. Another girl said there were a lot of noises out of the ordinary. She didn't think too much of the noises until we started comparing notes and times.

Most girls on the floor didn't believe me. The most common and frustrating response was, "We believe that you believe you saw her." They left the impression that I was under considerable pressure and imagined the entire thing or was just dreaming.

I don't believe it was a dream. In my dreams, although I know where I'm at, everything is different. When I woke up, everything was in its exact place in the room.

## Pemberton hall undergoes renovation

Eastern's Pemberton Hall, a registered historical landmark, is undergoing a renovation project in an effort to modernize the 76-year-old structure, Eastern's housing director said Tuesday.

The all-girl residence hall, which was constructed in 1908 and named after state Senator Stanton Pemberton, will be undergoing what Eastern Housing Director Lou Hencken calls preventive maintenance and restoration.

Hencken said the project, which is set for this semester, includes the repairs of six cracked, leaking shower stalls at \$1,000 each in the hall's old section. Bids for the showers have gone out, he added.

"To prevent the possibility of the showers cracking enough to allow water to leak down to the next floor's bathroom, the showers are going to be replaced," Hencken said.

Hoping to have the showers installed by spring break, Hencken said the bidding process has yet to be completed so a specific installation date cannot be set.

"We really aren't hurrying to do it," he added, noting that the project could be put off until the summer when students aren't occupying the hall. "The replacement is preventive maintenance, but it needs to be done."

In addition to the showers being replaced, Hencken said the rooms in the old section of Pemberton are being replastered and repainted. The rooms in the new section, the food service, hallways, lobby and the rest of the hall are also being repainted.

"We have done more plastering in the old section than we originally thought would have to be done," he added. "A lot of the rooms need work done."

Hencken said the entire painting project in Pemberton is expected to be completed by June.

Although Hencken did not know the exact cost of the labor involved in painting the building because of the irregularly shaped rooms, he noted that paint for Pemberton and Ford, McKin-

ney and Weller halls cost \$6,500. The expense of the Pemberton project would come from Housing Department funds, he added.

Pemberton Hall Counselor Patty Krenz said the residents of Pemberton "are appreciative" of the features that are unique to the old hall.

"They (students) put up with the small inconveniences that the repairs create," she said. "I am surprised that I have only heard a small number of complaints about the work being done."

"The painting is a big job and its taking a long time to get it done but I think everyone sees it as a worthwhile project," she added.

Hencken said that during winter break, the project may have been set back when a water pipe broke in the

recently refurbished Presidential Dining Room, requiring the removal of a wall to repair the pipe.

However, damage was minimal, Hencken added.

Other plans to restore Pemberton more to its original 1908 state "are in the planning stages," Hencken said, adding no further details were available.

Despite the renovations and the structure's age, Hencken said the 80-year-old section of the residence hall has not required many annual repairs.

"Pem is one of the better built buildings Eastern has on its campus so it doesn't need many repairs," he added. "I only hope I look as good as Pem does when I'm 80."

## Temperatures plunge to dangerous levels; record 23 below engulfs city in deep freeze

A small and very cold piece of history was made Sunday.

Even as people in Charleston, Chicago and other Midwestern cities watched Super Bowl XIX being played in the comparatively warm Palo Alto, Calif., temperatures in Central Illinois were the coldest on record.

The Coles County weather and road conditions phone service reported "extreme cold" Sunday, with a 1 p.m. temperature of 10 degrees below zero and a "dangerous" wind chill factor of 50 to 60 degrees below zero.

The service also predicted partly sunny skies and a temperature of 10-15 degrees above zero for Monday.

The *Associated Press* reported Sunday that Chicago thermometers also hit an all-time low temperature Sunday morning.

Sunday's cold snap—which blanketed states from the upper Midwest all the way to the Gulf Coast—chilled Chicagoans with a record-breaking low temperature of 27 degrees below zero and a wind chill factor of about 85 below.

The previous record, set Jan. 10, 1983, was 26 below, with a wind chill factor of negative 80.

As of 6 p.m. Sunday, the sub-zero temperatures were blamed for at least eight deaths in the Midwest, including

one in Chicago, according to AP wire reports. Hundreds of motorists were reported stranded on roads in Chicago and throughout the Great Lakes states.

Eastern Weather and Climate instructor Richard Wise said even local temperatures will vary from source to source, but added that Charleston, like Chicago, definitely reached an all-time low temperature Sunday morning.

"Most reports we had were around negative 22 or 23 (degrees Fahrenheit)," Wise said Sunday. "It's a record. There's no question about that."

Wise added that, although temperatures are expected to climb above zero by Monday afternoon, it will be colder than normal for "the next four or five days." The normal temperature for this time of year is 16 to 35 degrees above zero.

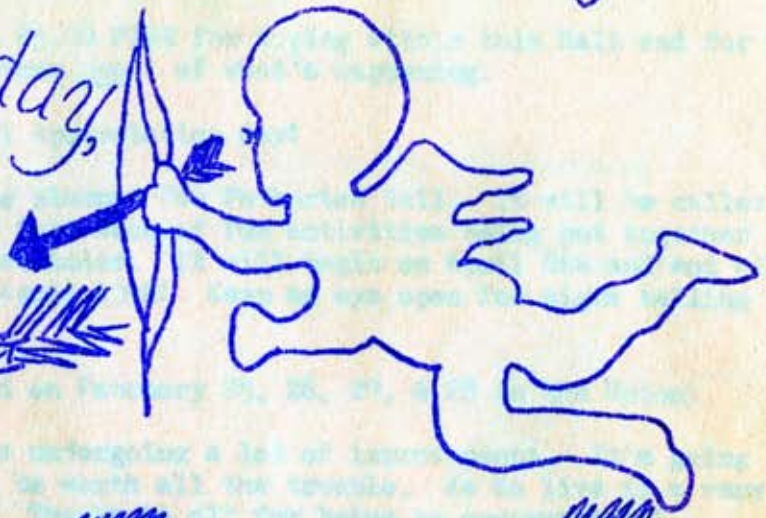
Although the weather caused thermometers to drop, county law enforcement, medical and emergency agencies reported that the number of weather-related problems remained low.

The Coles County Sheriff's Department, the Coles County Emergency Services and Disaster Agency and Sarah Bush Lincoln Health Center all reported no serious weather-related injuries during the weekend. Charleston police, ambulance and fire officials

HOUSING SURVEY RESULTS - FALL 1984

I just wanted to follow up on some of the results for Pemberton Hall. Some were good and some were not so good, but this helps Housing and our staff in particular to know what it is that you do like and other areas that need to be improved upon. (Please note results for the whole University posted on your floor.)

First off, there was quite a bit of dissatisfaction with the building structure itself. Many were unhappy with the appearance of their room, but much of this will be helped with a new paint job. The building is kept clean, but many were unhappy with the maintenance (repairs). All that can be said is that any repair requests are turned in the next day (if not sooner). It can be very complicated to explain the whole process, but we all do the best we can. There are many requests sent in every day from all the buildings on campus. In order to help out, you should re-report any repairs that have not been done after about 10 days. Any other complaints or suggestions - please see me directly or else I cannot help! As for study facilities, hopefully the upstairs study room (TV lounge) helps out. Any suggestions, please let us know. There is not much space in this building to be very creative.

There was very good response to the questions about the desk facilities and staff. Also, overall, most people said they really enjoy living here, and it's been a positive influence on their life. In fact, most agreed they were able to study in their room when they wish. This is a good indicator of how well people are cooperating with each other as far as noise and how good of an environment there is on the floors.

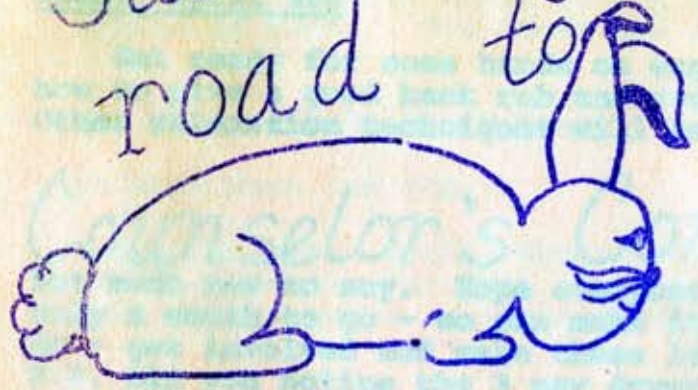

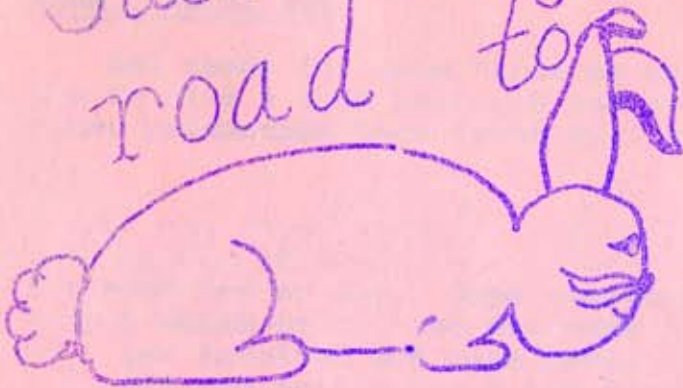
